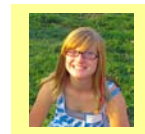

## **ANNUAL PICNIC 2012**



August 17<sup>th</sup> was the annual gathering of kids, families, and volunteers to celebrate the start of school and each other! This year was more fun than ever with an art project for kids organized by Lore McDonough, one of our mentors. Games were lead by Danielle Kemper, LCSW, therapist. The Astra Clubs of Delta and Cedaredge handled the set-up, take-down, and serving of the food. This youth organization emphasizes community service in their activities. All of them were a great big help in having a smooth running event. The picnic is a chance for the children to be surrounded by their family, their mentoring family, and other volunteers that have helped them through the year. School supplies are freely available at the picnic to make sure the children have everything necessary for a high achievement school year. The St. Nicholas program under the leadership of Jason Acheley and many private donors made the supplies available to the children. McDonalds and Big E Market contributed food for the picnic.

### **ELECTRONIC MEDICAL RECORDS FOR FAMILIES PLUS**

Families Plus was recently awarded a \$19,000 technology grant by the Colorado Rural Health Care Grant Council to purchase and implement a complete system of electronic health record (EHR) for the Families Plus mental health program. A state-of-the art computer program will replace the current paper charts and records that are becoming outdated. Families Plus has currently exceeded storage capacity for the 60+ very large charts in their records department. The therapists, who often are working out in the community, have difficulty accessing the health information in these charts. The new system will transfer all these records into one electronic file where all information is accessible to therapist with security clearance and adequate privacy protections. In addition to having health information that can be used, the new EHR system will allow Families Plus therapist to communicate securely on-line with others also supporting the health of the children served.

Families Plus will use their new expertise to assist other mental health care professionals in the area to explore and potentially implement their own electronic systems.

The grant is part of a five-year, \$7.5 million program funded by United Healthcare to encourage the delivery and quality of health care in facilities across the state. In its final year, United Healthcare and the Colorado Rural Health Care Grant Council awarded more than \$1,180,000 to 36 health care facilities across Colorado. United Healthcare and the Colorado Rural Health Care Grant Council are working together to improve the delivery and quality of health care services across Colorado's rural communities. These grants are one way they work to achieve that. Through this grant electronic health records will become common place in mental health care in Delta County.

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### FAMILIES PLUS CHILDREN AIM FOR GREAT GRADES

Families Plus therapist work with the parents, children, teachers, and mentors to help the children achieve a "C" grade or above in every academic class. By coordinating everyone's effort, most of the children are performing very well in school. The teachers of Delta County are consistently helpful in making suggestions to help improve performance. Families Plus children were strong in school performance during the 2011-12 school year. 78 percent of the participating children had a "C" grade point average or above over the school year. Most of the 8 children with lower grades were young children just settling into school routines.

This year 10 participants of Families Plus tried out a new camping experience. Camp Santa Maria is a YMCA camp located over by Grant, Colorado about 60 miles this side of Denver. The camping opportunity was organized by Sharon's Kids lead by Sharon Riegel. Just getting all the doctor physicals and paperwork together is a major undertaking. (Just ask Sharon.) Sharon also arranged most of the drivers to get the kids 231 miles to camp and back. Those assisting with transportation were Sharon Riegel, Larry Donathan, Donna Cochran, Rick Hite and Bob White.

Camp Santa Maria offered the kids a variety of experiences including hiking, swimming, art activities, singing, teamwork, and just the experience of being on your own away from home. A new feature for many of the kids was the two-week camp for the older youth. These youth were completely away from their family and community for two entire weeks. Everyone did amazingly well.

Camp Santa Maria generously discounted the usual camp fee to allow Families Plus children to attend. Kids, parents, and all of us are most appreciative of their large subsidy to get Families Plus children out in the world and their patience with all of our campers.

**THE PIANO PLAYER**

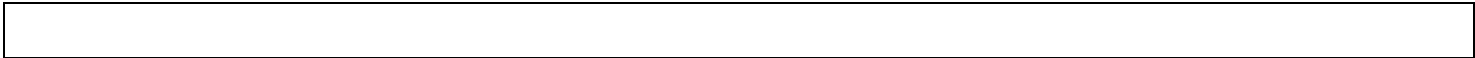

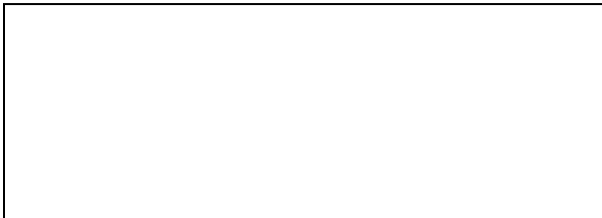
